South side youth sing at Inauguration of Governor Pat Quinn

The Salvation Army Kroc Corps Singing Company, which is comprised of 25 boys and girls ages 7 to 14 from the West Pullman and Roseland communities of Chicago, was personally selected by Governor Pat Quinn to perform at his Inaugural Celebration in Springfield. The group performed three songs immediately prior to the Inaugural Ceremony, at the Prairie Capitol Convention Center.

The Singing Company made a lasting impression on Governor Quinn at the Groundbreaking Ceremony for the Ray and Joan Kroc Corps Community Center in October. Caitlyn Bell, 7, a member of the Singing Company, performed a rousing chorale solo at the event, and introduced the Governor. At the event, Governor Quinn vowed to invite Caitlyn and the Kroc Corp Singing Company to perform at his Inaugural Ceremony. The Singing Company received a formal invitation in mid-December.

"We are honored and delighted that the Governor has recognized the talent of the children of our Singing Company and invited us to perform at such a special

event," said Salvation Army Major Darlene Harvey, Kroc Center Administrator. "This is an incredible opportunity for the children to be a part of history in the making. We're grateful to the Governor for so graciously inviting them to perform."

Since the groundbreaking of the Ray and Joan Kroc Corps Community Center in October 2010, construction has moved along steadily. The foundation is complete and the walls are quickly going up. During the next year of construction, The Kroc Center will create more than 200 construction jobs, including jobs for local residents. The Kroc Center is projected to be completed in 2012.

The capital campaign for the Kroc Center continues, with more than \$33 million of the \$50 million goal raised so far, in addition to the \$109.8 million from the Joan Kroc estate that was awarded to the project by The Salvation Army's Central Territorial Headquarters.

For more than three years, The Salvation Army Kroc Center Corps has collaborated with schools and community organi-
